Education is a crucial means of empowering society and reflecting a country's growth. In the case of India, since gaining independence in 1947, the government has implemented various educational policies and reforms to ensure education for all. These initiatives have yielded positive results, with a 97% literacy rate among children aged 6-14.


According to surveys and reports, the percentage of out-of-school children decreased to 2.97% in 2014, as per the National Survey on Estimation of Out-of-School Children. The Annual Status of Education Report (ASER)-2022, conducted by ASER Centre, states that 98.4% of children aged 6-14 are enrolled in schools. Additionally, there are over 30,000 NGOs working directly or indirectly in the education sector in India.





However, despite these achievements in enrollment, the quality and standard of teaching remain concerning. The ASER report highlights that a significant percentage of children lack foundational skills in reading and arithmetic. For instance, only 20% of children in std-3 can read at a std-2 level, and the percentages for arithmetic skills are similarly low. Furthermore, there is a decline in enrollment rates among the 15-16 age group.

In terms of higher education, the Gross Enrolment Ratio (GER) in India, according to the All India Survey on Higher Education (AISHE) 2020-2021, is 27% for the age group of 18-23.



To address these challenges, the Indian government introduced the National Education Policy 2020 (NEP-2020), which aims to enhance the education system and cater to the requirements of a developed nation. The policy focuses on various aspects such as holistic education, early childhood care, a revised school education structure (5+3+3+4), multidisciplinary learning, skill development integration, technology integration, teacher training, competency-based assessment reforms, higher education reforms, promotion of Indian languages, inclusion and equity, as well as governance and funding reforms.

The goal is to utilize NEP-2020 as a foundational framework to elevate the educational standards among children. Building on the progress made by NGOs in achieving near 100% enrollment, the objective now is to attain higher levels of knowledge as outlined in NEP-2020.



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
